Pope Francis' Integral Ecology and the Consistent Ethic of Life: Calls for a Wider Moral Vision

As we celebrate the fifth anniversary of the Encyclical, *Laudato Si'*, this talk will compare some contours of the encyclical with the Consistent Ethic of Life espoused by the late Cardinal Joseph Bernardin. This talk contrasts Franciscan joy and mere cheerfulness in the final installment to a work on the emotional range in the Franciscan tradition. The purpose of my work on emotional range in the Franciscan tradition is to explore the role various emotions have in the process of ongoing conversion and to rescue the Franciscan spiritual tradition from the pitfalls of mere quaintness and cuteness. *Click [here](#) to register.*

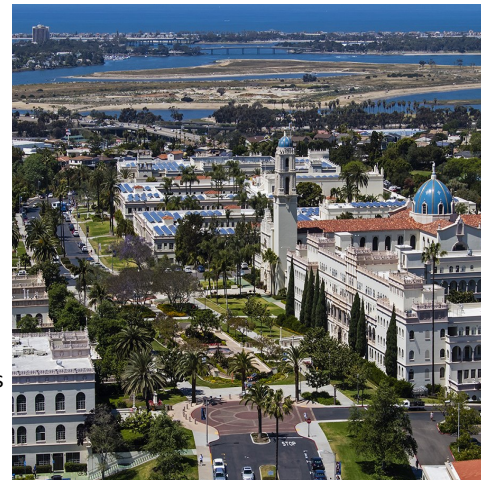
Young Adult Catholics: Why Questions are Better Than Answers
